JOINT CONFERENCE UPDATE

t's a new school year. That translates to new challenges. More demands. Increased accountability. Decreased dollars.

For school leaders, the enhanced focus on student achievement—and documenting that achievement—has resulted in new requirements for educator and administrator evaluations and implementation of the national Common Core standards and the accompanying, much-debated PARCC assessment. Recent legislation has brought new regulations around student discipline and out-of-school suspensions. New initiatives designed to help every child succeed include Recovery High Schools, Innovation Schools, virtual schools, expanded options through educational collaboratives, home-school networks, and renewed focus on offering rigorous, 21st century skills-driven curricula at vocational-technical schools.

So you're now thinking: show me the money. And deliver our districts from (more) unfunded mandates.

And just to further add to the fiscal/regulatory uncertainties, the gubernatorial election in November may have considerable ramifications on future school district budgets.

While magic wands and fairy dust are in short supply, the opportunity to take control of these issues and manage the challenges is close at hand. The upcoming MASC/MASS Joint Conference in Hyannis will address these concerns and many others over the expanded four-day event, November 5-8.

The most ambitious conference program to date will feature more than 75 panel sessions, keynote programs

and featured guest speakers, as well as new sponsor-partner informational sessions that you can attend. Beginning on Wednesday, November 5 at noon, special strands will focus on fiscal and cost-savings initiatives as well as how collaboratives are offering new programs and services that can help districts remain cost-effective and competitive. Other highlights on the agenda are reports from districts who participated in a PARCC trial assessment this past spring; labor relations efforts to ensure an effective educator evaluation process; legal and legislative updates; fiscal and public relations concerns for regional and vocational schools; superintendent evaluation and succession planning; and a number of student-centered programs including leadership strategies for student achievement; the benefits of extended learning time; initiatives to help high-risk teens; student health and wellness programs; and a discussion around the devastating ramifications of student stress.

In addition to the full line-up of panels (check your mailbox for the recently mailed conference flyer or view the complete schedule on the MASC website at www.masc.org), the ever-popular exhibit hall will open on Wednesday afternoon with a record number of vendors. This year will also feature a new strand of sessions offered by some of our sponsor partners (titles and times to be announced in an upcoming mailing). And don't forget to join in the Bingo Game challenge with prizes, prizes, prizes for the lucky winners of the Bingo draw.

Featured speakers this year begin at the Keynote Dinner on Wednesday with radio/tv political commentator **Jim Braude** who will offer a post-election post-mortem. Thursday General Session speaker **Douglas Stone**, a noted author and professor at Harvard Law School, will share his insights on how to engage in difficult conversations and learn from feedback, be it professional, personal or political.

Also new this year is an entirely different Thursday evening dinner program. The conference planners realized that after two days of informa-

Friday General Session speaker Herman Boone, former coach of the award-winning high school football team, the Titans, will share his experiences trying to mold a team out of a group of initially divisive and distrusting players. Friday luncheon guest speaker, Early Education and Care Commissioner Tom Weber, will discuss new initiatives his office is implementing to provide increased

access to programs and services to ensure every young child arrives at school prepared to learn and thrive.

Friday evening, the MASC Board of Directors will host the traditional Life Member/Leadership Awards banquet at which new and returning Life Members will be recognized and awards to the 2014 All-State School Committee and Lifetime Achievement recipients will be presented. EXPANDED FRIDAY-SATURDAY PROGRAM

Well aware of the time and financial constraints on many school committee members, the conference planning committee opted this year to expand the Friday-Saturday portion of the conference with a full day and a half of key sessions focused on school

leadership for those whose schedules make it impossible to attend the full conference. With the Delegate Assembly scheduled this year for Wednesday afternoon (instead of the usual Friday afternoon), there is a full slate of valuable programs on Friday and Saturday, ending with a **Student Voices Lunch** on Saturday where the guest speakers will be current and former MA student leaders who will engage members in a discussion about their educational experience: what worked, what didn't and how well they were prepared for college/work life. This is an important opportunity to hear from these students and how they believe school leaders can improve the school and learning environment.

MASC testifies on Common Core and PARCC at Local Government Advisory Committee Meeting

MASC President-Elect Patrick Francomano (King Philip Regional) and Vice President Jake Oliveira (Ludlow) presented compelling testimony to members of the Local Government Advisory Committee at its monthly meeting on September 9. Attendees included mayors and selectmen from communities across the state, as well as the members of the Governor's cabinet and members of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

Francomano commented on the controversy that has arisen around the Common Core standards and the PARCC assessment system, suggesting that much of this has been driven by partisan politics. He added, however, that having gone through 20 years of education reform where it's pretty clear that no one really has the answers to:

- The best standards for curriculum and student achievement?
- The best way to turn around underperforming schools?
- Whether the schools that we have

labeled, if not demonized, for underperformance, are actually underperforming in a national sense?

- Is PARCC really an improvement, or just representative of "what's going around now"?
- Who is profiting from this new testing system and is the profiteering on education reform acceptable?

Oliveira noted that MASC has supported the Common Core and PARCC in part because the state accepted the Race to the Top funding and believe that it is a more effective strategy to help students think critically and creatively. However, he added, MASC is concerned about the following:

- As PARCC replaces MCAS in certain situations, how do we know that scores from this new testing concept will be calibrated appropriately so that they are not used to discredit school districts trying to adapt to new standards?
- How will we absorb the costs of obtaining the technology to administer the tests?
- Will test results be available in time to help students select the best courses and allow faculty to guide students appropriately?
- How will we actually assess whether or not the PARCC system is actually working? On Thursday, November 6 at the Joint

Conference in Hyannis, two sessions will focus on the Common Core and PARCC, including a discussion of the concerns around the new standards and test, and a report from three districts that piloted the test in the spring of 2014.

The meeting will provide an overview of the resolutions to be debated at the upcoming Delegate Assembly; a discussion on Common Core and PARCC; and a model for members who have expressed interest in convening a "town hall-style" meeting in their districts to get comments and set priorities around changes to the Chapter 70 funding formula which will be considered in the upcoming months by the recently re-established Foundation Budget Review Commission.

20th annual PRUDENTIAL SPIRIT OF

COMMUNITY AWARDS

Recognizing young people for outstanding volunteer service

Created in 1995, the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards recognize students in grades 5-12 who have made meaningful contributions to their communities through volunteer service. These prestigious awards, sponsored by Prudential Financial in partnership wit the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) are presented annually at the local, state and national levels.

Participating schools and local organizations will select Local Honorees in early November and present them with Certificates of Achievement. These honorees are then reviewed by a state-level judging committee, which will name the two top candidates from each state and the District of Columbia—one high school student and one middle level student—as State Honorees on February 10,

2015. These Honorees wil receive \$1,000 awards and an all-expense paid trip to Washington DC with a parent for four days of recognition events May 2-5, 2015. In Washington, a national selection committee will name 10 of the 102 State Honorees as America's top youth volunteers of 2015. These National Honorees will receive \$5,000 and \$5,000 grants from The Prudential Foundation for the nonprofit charitable organizations of their choice.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? ANY STUDENT WHO:

- is in grades 5-12 as of November 4, 2014 and is a legal resident of one of the 50 states or the District of Columbia.
- has engaged in a volunteer activity that occurred at least in part after September 1, 2013.
- completes an application and submits it to a school principal or the head of an officially designated local organization by November 4, 2014.
