Governor files legislation to encourage creation of empowerment zones

Testifying on the Governor's FY2020 education funding proposal before the Joint Ways and Means Committee on Monday, March 18, Lt. Governor Karen Polito and Education Secretary James Peyser announced that the Governor will be filing legislation to encourage development of so-called "empowerment zones."

The bill will be based on legislation filed last session by House Education Committee Chair Alice Peisch and Sen. Eric Lesser, following an "empowerment zone" model piloted by the Springfield Public School district.

The bill, according to the Baker administration, would define an innovation partnership zone as at least two schools or one school enrolling more than 1,000 students, governed by a board of directors with the approval of the local school committee or the state Board of Elementary and Secondary Education. intendent, mayor, local teachers' union, school committee members, teachers, or a group of parents to start the process to create an innovation partnership zone. The elementary and secondary education commissioner could also initiate a zone instead of a receivership, or to transition out of receivership, for schools performing in approximately the lowest 15 percent statewide.

The zones would operate under renewable five-year performance agreements between their boards and the local school committee or state education commissioner. They would be able to negotiate directly with the local teachers' union and to contract with eligible operating entities for day-to-day management of their schools, including nonprofits, higher education institutions or "groups of experienced educators."

In 2018 when the Governor endorsed the empowerment zone legislation MASC expressed serious concerns that the zones were a backdoor strategy for private

operators and the administration to sidestep the outcome of the charter school ballot question and circumvent local school committee and community approval of any newly established school or school realignment.

As outlined in MASC's 2019 Legislative Priorities "these empowerment zones, as conceived by some proponents, could be established by the commissioner of elementary and secondary education without the consent of the cities, towns and regions that would have to host them, but instead by overseen by appointed bodies with no assurance that real parent or local input would be sought. MASC believes that any restructuring of a school district or schools within them without the consent of the elected local leadership or the people (i.e., school committee, city council, town meeting or local referendum) is a violation of democratic principles of local control and transparent government."

Empowerment zones will be among the issues that will be discussed at MASC's upcoming Day on the Hill on Wednesday, May 1. Other topics will include revisions to the Foundation Budget formula, regional transportation funding, the challenges of small and rural school districts, circuit breaker update, charter school mitigation, and the social services safety net. Grand testing experiment fizzles as states shake off Federal dictates

According to a recent survey by Education Week, the testing revolution sparked by the Common Core has all but evaporated in less than a decade, with only a third of the states still using the federally funded assessments designed to measure those standards.

In the current academic year, only 16 states are still using the PARCC or Smarter Balanced assessments in math and English/ language arts. When the tests were being designed in 2010-2011, 45 states (including Massachusetts) reported plans to use them. Three years later, a year before the tests actually became available, only half the states were still on board and that has dwindled to a third.

The initial plan to have states sharing the same assessments would have been an unprecedented shift in US educational testing. States had never before agreed in such large numbers to use one set of academic standards and tests. The premise was that this singe test and standards would allow parents and policymakers to compare student progress across the states.

But opposition to the length and costs of the tests led most states to go back to implementing their own test. While not abandoning the not wildly popular MCAS test, Massachusetts administered the PARCC exam selectively for two years before returning to a revised MCAS 2.0 graduation requirement. Currently only 13 states require students to pass a test to get a high school diploma, compared to more than half the states in 2002. In some states, students can use projects or portfolios to meet this requirement.

SFY19 SAFER SCHOOLS AND COM-MUNITIES EQUIPMENT & TECH-NOLOGY GRANT OPPORTUNITY

The Executive Office of Public Safety and Security's (EOPSS) Office of Grants and Research (OGR) will make available \$7.2*M* in funding for school districts and charter schools to competitively solicit one-time grant funding to assist public schools and local municipalities with enhancing school security and the safety of students and staff. Priority will be given to school districts and charter schools demonstrating the greatest need AND proposing cost-effective solutions to addressing high-priority gaps or weaknesses. Consideration will be also be given to schools that are taking meaningful steps to establish a more safe and supportive school climate, in order to reduce instances of violence.

Applicant Eligibility

A school district or charter school, in collaboration with its local municipality (host city/town where the public school(s) are located) that certifies that it has a Multi-Hazard School Emergency Threat Assessment and Response Plan already in place is eligible to apply.

Both the Municipal Chief Executive Officer (Mayor, City Manager, or Town Administrator) of the host community AND School Superintendent or Charter School Executive Director seeking a grant award must sign the application being submitted. Only one (1) application per school district and one (1) application per charter school is permitted for consideration of funding.


